Conservation Collaboration:

There is no doubt that we live in a state with some of the most beautiful and diverse natural settings in the world. As birders, this gives us the opportunity to experience a wide variety of habitat and the birds they support. However, this variety of habitat and the size of our state presents a real challenge to mounting sustained and successful conservation efforts.

One of the key missions of Audubon is the passionate conservation of the habitat that supports birds. And as you know, Audubon is not alone in its mission to preserve these habitats, even if other organizations have differing missions. So, in the coming year we will be collaborating with some of these organizations in order to ensure our voice is heard and we can successfully impact the conservation "conversation" in Minnesota.

Of course we will continue to work with National Audubon and a revitalized Audubon MN, but we will also be looking for ways to be involved with the work of the Minnesota Environmental Partnership (MEP) and the Minnesota Izaak Walton League (IWL).

Both MEP and the IWL have robust political action organizations. MRVAC has been a long-term member of MEP and has signed on to a number of their communications and press releases. The IWL works closely with the MEP and has additional experts and lobbyists that are working tirelessly at the capitol and with other groups to push a comprehensive conservation agenda.

National Audubon has just released their annual report for 2015. For those of you who are members of National you should have received a copy and I would highly recommend you review it. At the state level we will be working with Audubon Minnesota and other MN Audubon Chapters to breathe life into the strategic framework on page 10. Specifically, the MN Chapter Leaders would like to focus on building local action plans around these key areas:

- · Saving Important Bird Areas
- · Shaping a Healthy Climate and Clean Energy
- Creating Bird-Friendly Communities

In the future we will be looking for ways our membership can be more involved in making our voices heard. We will start by posting relevant action alerts to our Facebook page and bringing key issues to our refuge meetings for

discussion and action. I hope you take a few minutes to "like" the MRVAC Facebook page and review these alerts and take personal action. Your voice is important!

Conservation News and Special Events

Old Cedar Parking Lot and Trailhead Have Reopened, May Experience Intermittent Closures

Work on the water control structure and associated levee at the head of the Bluff Trail from Old Cedar Avenue has been partially completed. This partial completion has allowed for the safe reopening of the Old Cedar Avenue parking lot as well as the trailheads from the parking lot to Hogback Ridge and Bluff Trails.

The rebuilding of the boardwalk extending onto Long Meadow Lake will begin sometime in December. To accommodate the delivery of materials and construction of the boardwalk, the Old Cedar Avenue parking lot and head of the Bluff Trail will experience intermittent closures during business hours.

Due to private property encroachment on the Bluff Trail approximately 1/2 mile west of Old Cedar Avenue, a short trail detour has been established. Please respect private property and follow the detour.

The trailhead to Hogback Ridge Trail from the Old Cedar Avenue parking lot has also been reopened as planned work has been temporarily suspended due to winter weather conditions.

Full or partial closures of the trails, trailheads and parking lot at Old Cedar Avenue are likely again in the spring and summer of 2016 as project work is completed in the area.

Audubon Minnesota & MRVAC Support Proposed Lead Shot Ban

In October 2015, the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources proposed a rule to require hunters to use only nontoxic shot on wildlife management areas (WMAs) within the farmland zone beginning in 2018. Audubon has worked for decades with a wide range of conservationists, including hunters and wildlife advocates, to ensure the health of birds and ecosystems. We have a vested interest in healthy hunting. Audubon supports the proposed DNR rule change because lead is poison and as conservationists, we should all be working to remove lead from the environment. - Lead is toxic to both birds and people.
- Millions of birds are poisoned every year by lead shot.
- The establishment of nontoxic shot zones has been shown, by scientific research, to radically reduce the number of bird deaths from lead poisoning.

Your Help is Needed for Climate Watch, A New Citizen Science Program

Audubon Climate Watch is a new citizen science program that explores how North American Birds are responding to climate change. In 2014, Audubon released the Audubon Birds and Climate Change report highlighting the risks that climate change poses to birds. Now, you can help by observing birds and learning more about how birds are responding to climate change.

MRVAC members are needed to volunteer for a few hours during the Martin Luther King Jr. weekend, Jan. 15-18, 2016. This will kick off the pilot phase of Climate Watch. MRVAC will be a key part of the collaborative team that develops materials and resources, including mapping tools, for Climate Watch and will have the opportunity to represent the Audubon chapter network in helping to create this new national program.

The pilot will focus on areas of predicted change for bluebirds and targeted area maps will be provided so volunteers can survey appropriate habitat within the grid cell. At least 10 volunteers are needed.
