

Are You a Naturalist?

From "The Compass to Nature", a curriculum created by the US Fish and Wildlife Service - Prairie Wetlands Learning Center in Fergus Falls, Minnesota, the definition of a naturalist is "a person who studies nature."

This curriculum aptly describes naturalists as people who "make observations, record data, and share their discoveries with others. They are skilled in exploring, observing, organizing, collecting, describing, inventing and experimenting." Some famous North American naturalists include Byrd Baylor, John Muir, George Washington Carver, and Rachel Carson. Naturalists have common characteristics, even as children. They are "prepared, quiet, observant, patient, curious, respectful, full of wonder, in the moment, and sharing." Who wouldn't want to be described with these positive qualities?

Also from this curriculum, a naturalist pays close attention to changes and differences over time, respects nature, uses clues to explain natural events, keeps records, thinks reflectively, and shares experiences, delight and discoveries. This sounds like just the kind of person I want to go on a walk with! So, are you a Naturalist?

Naturalists contribute to our quality of life and remind us to live in balance with the Earth. Keep on being curious!

Take 5 for Nature: In Otter News...

Human beings aren't the only creatures with an appreciation for sledding in winter. River otters, one of many incredible species found at the Lowry Nature Center, will playfully zip, dive, and hurl their bodies down steep, snow-packed slopes leaving behind belly-wide runways in the snow. In addition to appearing to enjoy themselves, this behavior is thought to help sharpen their predatory skills and maneuvers.

Otter tracks and slides often lead to narrow pockets of open water as their sleek bodies are seamlessly suited for aquatic life. Their exceptionally dense fur and webbed feet allow them to remain active beneath the ice throughout the coldest months of the year. Thanks to these favorable adaptations, otters are considered the largest aquatic carnivores in Minnesota feeding on fish, clams, and even turtles.

An adult river otter can measure up to five and a half feet long including a powerful 18-inch tail. They belong to the Mustelid (*weasel*) family and will weigh an average of 15-19 pounds. Thanks to decades of interagency wetland restoration efforts, otters are becoming more common throughout the state and are protected in all areas managed by Three Rivers Park District including at the Lowry Nature Center in Carver Park Reserve.

This self-guided activity book helps children discover more about the natural environment and what steps they can take to preserve it for future generations. We hope to encourage folks to explore the biodiversity of the greater Sax-Zim Bog region and to use iNaturalist on our properties during all seasons! The January BogDiversity Challenge is at the Warren Nelson Bog! This property is the largest owned by the Friends of Sax-Zim Bog at 120 acres. Much of this property is not easily accessible, but it is one of three properties with a boardwalk. We hope to be creating a snowshoe trail that will allow access along the width of the property.
