A Note From Our President

Do you remember your gateway bird, or, like me, you've just always been interested in birds and it gradually escalated into this wonderful semi-obsession?

Do you remember your first contact with MRVAC? I don't recall that, either. Maybe it was a field trip. Maybe one of the great monthly programs. I do recall running into Steve Weston a whole lot in the field. And I recall when he asked me to be a board member. That was in 2018; I was surprised. I'm not an expert birder. I just love wandering around in the woods and gawking at nature. Who'd want me, a market researcher, former pollster and former journalist, to be on an Audubon board?

As you can figure out, the board welcomed me and I took up its secretarial duties, added website responsibilities and last spring it asked me to lead the board as president. I appreciate and am awed by that trust. I've come to realize that MRVAC's most important resource is its members and other folk of like minds.

That's especially true now at election time.

With all the polarization, rural-urban divide, economic troubles, media clutter and even the global tensions, it's incumbent on us to keep focused on things we can do to help the environment, habitat and the birds that depend on them. So here's my request of you.

Even if you think you know some of the candidates in your district, it's important to do the due diligence this year as redistricting has changed many voting district boundaries, including state legislative districts. For example, I learned that my State House district has changed, and I didn't know one of the candidates. Find the candidates that will

be on your ballot. Serious candidates in competitive races will have a website you can use to compare their important issues with our commitment of conservation and habitat.

I find it useful to print out the ballot and take some notes. You can take your notes into the voting booth with you. That makes it quicker and easier. Better yet, vote before Election Day and not have to stand in line as this year as turnout – despite it being a non-presidential election year – is expected to be heavy.

You'll have done yourself and the birds a favor.

The highlight of my day occurred at the end when I arrived at Murphy-Hanrehan Park in Scott County. I got a great look at a Hooded Warbler and heard a Barred Owl hooting in the woods.

Christmas Bird Counts

Participate in the country's longest running bird count this year! The 123rd Audubon Christmas Bird Count (CBC) will be held in over 85 locations in Minnesota, from December 14th to January 5th. Experienced or not, we need your eyes and ears!

To participate in the CBC, all you need to do is help count birds in a given "circle" radius. To join a count, visit moumn.org/CBC/locations_map.php and contact the count compiler for more details. Stay tuned for the dates of individual counts, as the compilers begin planning. New counts this year include Ortonville, West Hennepin County, and West Minneapolis (a BIPOC count). MRVAC sponsored counts include Bloomington and Excelsior counts on December 17th and Cedar Creek Bog on December 18th. A pot-luck gathering is being planned after the Bloomington count and participants will receive more information soon.

New Islands Mean New Birding Opportunities in St. Paul

There is new land being created in Saint Paul's east side! It's not a volcano spewing out lava into the sea as in Hawai'i. It's an Army Corp of Engineers project on Pigs Eye Lake creating multiple islands in this 628-acre lake.

There one can see a huge pipe disgorging a slurry of dredge sand and water being molded into an ever-increasing new island by bulldozers and other heavy equipment. These planned seven new islands will stabilize shorelines, help restore wetlands, and improve wildlife habitat. Signs at the launch site list the work is being done by Brennan: Marine Professionals since 1919. They are employing drag-lines to fill barges with dredged sand from further south on Pigs Eye Lake's channel to the Mississippi River. The loaded barges are then pushed to an awaiting moored platform barge with a huge clam shell excavator. It takes giant

bites of said sand and dumps it into a hopper where it is mixed with river water. That feeds it into a powerful pump to begin a long sinuous route to the north end of the lake.

Pigs Eye Lake is part of Saint Paul's Battle Creek Regional Park. If you are a careful driver, you can motor all the way into Pigs Eye Regional Park park off Child's Road but be wary. The road is poorly maintained and heavily rutted in places. Three weeks ago, I drove there, and the entire road was overgrown with plants. Even from the park's southern shore on Pigs Eye Lake, the island work is a long way off and binoculars really help.

From the crude boat launch into the lake from the south shore, I needed my spotting scope to discern any details at all.

For a better view go to US-61 and Lower Afton Road, turning south on Point Douglas Road. Within a short distance you will find safe spots to pull over and take in the project.

I bird around there frequently and a week ago was pleased to see around 800 Ring-billed gulls strung out in a long line-up on the island's growing shoreline along with Double-crested Cormorants and scattered Canada geese. A modest number of Barn swallows are always flitting over the lake in their aerial acrobatics, catching insects both

in the air and on the water's surface. The occasional Bald Eagle and Great Blue Heron also grace this lake. The herons have a lively rookery on the lake's far southern reaches. Their rookery is on a 100-acre island and also hosts Great egrets. Come migration seasons this lake fills up with a plethora of waterfowl, warblers, and scattered shorebirds. When the project ends in fall, 2025 it will be a sight to behold.

October Big Day 2022: A Global Birding Achievement

On 8 October, people in 185 countries around the world joined together to celebrate birds for October Big Day. More than 34,670 contributors reported an incredible 7,453 species on 80,000 checklists, setting THREE new records for the single biggest day in October birding history!

An extra warm welcome to the 2,800 contributors around the world who eBirded for the first time on October Big Day. This year's global team featured an astounding 2,000 more participants than last year, including 600 participants in Africa, 2,160 in Asia, 2,960 in Europe, and 5,460 in Central and South America.

October Big Day wouldn't be a global phenomenon without YOU, the global birding community. We're grateful to work with so many amazing partner groups around the world, including the eBird portal collaborator network, who inspire and motivate birders on October Big Day and every day. Huge thanks also to Carl Zeiss Sports Optics for their sponsorship of eBirder of the Month challenge, including an opportunity to win new Zeiss SFL binoculars by participating in October Big Day.

This year's October Big Day was also an opportunity to celebrate World Migratory Bird Day and Global Bird Weekend. Tremendous thanks to Global Birding's Tim Appleton and Penny Robinson, Birdlife International, and Swarovski Optik for making Global Bird Weekend possible, and to the World Migratory Bird Day team for their efforts.

October Big Day by the numbers

- 34,670 people went birding
- 80,035 checklists submitted
- 7,453 species reported (184 more species than last year)
- 45,356 photos submitted to the Macaulay Library
- 1,563 recordings submitted to the Macaulay Library
- 184,900 Merlin users saved nearly 28,300 bird identifications




Cost is \$30 and registration is required. Registration typically closes the day before the program at 12 p.m. Register at www.dodgenaturecenter.org
